MRI Screening for Cavaliers for SM, and PSOM

Advanced Animal Imaging (AAI) located in Fort Wayne, Indiana now offers MRI screening for Cavalier King Charles Spaniel Breeders and Rescue Coordinators. AAI offers Syringomyelia (SM), Chiari-like Malformation (CM or CLM), and Primary Secretory Otitis Media (PSOM) MRI screening.

The cost of an MRI screening (mini scan) exam is \$495.00 which includes consultation if

needed, the MRI exam, the reading of the exam and anesthesia.

A discounted pre-screening bloodwork is available at the veterinary clinic upstairs for \$75.00. Prescreening lab work is required before any pet can be put under anesthesia. Owners may opt to use their own veterinarian for prescreening lab and can have the lab results faxed to us or brought to us upon their appointment. Pre -screening blood includes: a full CBC / Chem panel and should be performed within 7 days prior to your appointment.

Summer Pet Safety Tips

Warm weather safety makes summer time more enjoyable for both you and your pet. Keeping some simple precautions in mind will contribute to a healthy, happy summer.

Remember that dogs and cats tend to stay outside longer during the summer months and generally have more contact with other animals so it's important that your pet's vaccinations are up to date.

Fleas, ticks, and mosquitoes that carry heartworm disease are more prevalent during the summer months. Be sure to see your veterinarian for an effective preventative.

Keep dogs and cats off lawns that have been chemically treated or fertilized within the last 24 hours.

NEVER, never leave your pet in a closed vehicle on a hot day. Temperatures inside your car can rise to 100 degrees in a matter of minutes. Opening a window will not help.

If your dog or cat is outside on a hot day, be sure there is plenty of shade and lots of cool, fresh water. Temperatures in the shade can be up to 15 degrees cooler. Dog and cat houses tend to trap heat and are not a good source of shade. A child's wading pool is a great way fro your pet to cool off.

Avoid strenuous exercise on hot days. Plan your walks for early in the morning or later in the day. Soak a bandana in water, freeze it, and tie it around your dog's neck when they walk or jog with you. Be sure to limit your pet's time on the hot asphalt or sand – it can burn their paws.

Don't forget the sunscreen, especially if your dog or cat has short hair, pink skin or white fur. It's beneficial to apply sunscreen to noses and ears 30 minutes before going outside.

Tick removal

Spring will be here soon and the ticks will soon be showing their heads. Here is a good way to get them off you, your children, or your pets. Give it a try.

Apply a glob of liquid soap to a cotton ball. Cover the tick with the soap-soaked cotton ball and swab it for a few seconds (15-20), the tick will come out on its own and be stuck to the cotton ball when you lift it away. This technique has worked every time I've used it (and that was frequently, and it's much less traumatic for the patient and easier for me.

Unless someone is allergic to soap, I can't see that this would be damaging in any way. I even had my doctor's wife call me for advice because she had one stuck to her back and she couldn't reach it with tweezers. She used this method and immediately called me back to say, "It worked!"

<u>INTESTINAL PARASITES</u> – While some intestinal parasites produce few symptoms, others can cause vomiting, diarrhea, and extreme discomfort in pets. What's more, certain parasites are zoonotic, meaning they can affect human family members.

I just found out that the Michigan Veterinary Specialists office located in Grand Rapids now has a Cardiologist. They are offering clinic days once a month. Usually the 1st Wednesday of each month between 3-4 pm. They are also combining the day with an eye clinic, so you will be able to do them both at the same time. You can go in on different days, but then the cost is more. The fees are as follows:

Heart - Clinic day - \$28.00

Heart - Non Clinic day - \$60 1st dog, \$50 for each additional dog

Eye - Clinic day - \$47.00 Eye - Non Clinic day - \$98.00


